

If you own a plastic tree, only replace it when it's fully on its last legs.

It takes roughly 10 years for a plastic tree to equal the carbon footprint of a real tree that is thrown out each year.

LED lights use 80-90% less energy than standard bulbs and generally last 100,000 hours verses 3000 of standard bulbs
